This quarter we delivered the E-Commerce Workshop which highlighted the need to work closer with postal agencies and have proper



We also ran the Criminal Business Disruption Workshop that saw the need to interagency cooperation at the border and the need to ensure intelligence is collected and provided to the transnational crime unit, we saw the strength of working with the immigration agencies and financial intelligence units and saw the impact that the PTCCC has in providing an "overwatch" for regional criminal activity in the pacific.

What both these workshops highlighted was the need to act collectively for border security, a theme that is manifested politically through the BOE declaration and Blue Pacific partnership strategies. We also note that our members in the North Pacific are beginning to shift to a more modern adaptation of customs processes with introduction of the HS commodity coding system, single window and ASYCUDA gaining political support and transitioning into action at a national level for us to engage in. The collaboration at the border will ensure single window concepts will be realized in the Pacific and Vanuatu demonstrated that capability during the workshops and then commenced its partnership with the Post office in a manner that signals compliance to international best practice. I would urge all members to look carefully at what Vanuatu has been able to achieve by having technology and law , government and private sector support all Come together for a common purpose in trade facilitation and border security. If Vanuatu can do it , so can you and we are there to assist.

Before I sign off, I must thank the staff of OCO Secretariat for arranging the workshops as the feedback from members and external participants has been outstanding. 

Pacific Small Craft App Training for Savusavu Front Liners

The Oceania Customs Organisation together with the Australian Border Force conducted a 2 day training for the Savusavu front line officers on the use of the Pacific Small Craft App to capture incoming yacht data. This training was conducted ahead of the Blue Lane initiative launch in Savusavu which was expected to bring in Yachts from all over the world. <u>Read More</u>..



Virtual Workshop on Digital Customs and Ecommerce

The Oceania Customs Organisation organized its first *Virtual Workshop on Digital Customs & Ecommerce* from 18 -21 May, 2021 with 85 Customs officials from 16 countries participating. ABF hands over Mobile Phones to FRCS

The Australian Border Force together with OCO Head of Secretariat and Operations Manager handed over 15 mobile phones to the CEO of Fiji Revenue and Customs Service. These devices will be used by the FRCS front line officers while processing Small Craft Apps that enter the Fiji Ports. This follows training that was conducted in Savusavu and Denarau ports consisting of Customs front liners, Fiji Immigration and Police. Small crafts remain a high threat to all countries in the Pacific being used for a number of illicit activities, including the movement of weapons, drugs and people. Small craft continue to be targeted by organized crime groups for the transport of illicit drugs as well.



Criminal Business Disruption Workshop

The Criminal Business Disruption Workshop was conducted virtually by the OCO Secretariat from the 1st to 3rd of June 2021. The workshop was a collaboration with members and development partners from The Australia Border Force (ABF), Australian Federal Police – TCU Fiji, Australia Pacific Security College (APSC), APG- Asia Pacific Group for Money Laundering, AUSTRAC- Australia Financial Intelligence arm, Fiji Financial Intelligence Unit (F-FIU), Fiji Revenue and Customs Service (FRCS), International Narcotics Control Board (INCB), Pacific Transnational Crime Coordination Centre (PTCCC), Pacific Transnational Crime Network (PTCN), Pacific Immigration Development Community (PIDC), Pacific Islands Chief of Police (PICP), Joint Interagency Task Force-West (JIATF-W), Pacific Islands Forum Secretariat (PIFS), PSI – Pharmaceutical Society International, Regional Intelligence Liaison Office (RILO-WCO), Transnational Crime Unit (TCU-Fiji).United Nations office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) Global Smart, UNODC Fiji Office, US Homeland Security Investigation-HSI, US Department of Justice International Computer Hacking and Intellectual Property (ICHIP) and the United States Patent and Trademark Office (USPTO). Vanuatu Implements Electronic Single Windows System



Vanuatu is proudly leading the way on the E-Commerce front in the Pacific. The country has implemented the Electronic Single Window system which functions as the hub for Border Control agencies and traders. Vanuatu also led the way in creating the first Passenger Module into the Automated System for Customs Data (ASYCUDA) system as well as creating the first direct online payment between a bank and Customs in the Pacific. Further to this, they have created the first ever Sanitary and Phytosanitary(SPS) module for Biosecurity in ASYCUDA as well as automate Biosecurity border control processing in ASYCUDA. <u>Read More</u>.
